FROM JEFF'S DESK ...

Richard Foster has written a book titled: "Prayer - Finding the Heart's True Home" - which is a wonderful description to hold in our hearts and minds as we think about this gift of God to us. We touched on the book during a "What Presbyterians Believe" class, and I thought it would make for a nice sermon series. So... here we go.

Foster offers a very down-to-earth understanding and experience of prayer that makes it easy for anyone to connect - at some level - with what he writes. I particularly like the structure he uses to invite us in: three movements into prayer that are Trinitarian in character.

"The movement inward (Part I) is prayer to God the Son, Jesus Christ, which corresponds to his role as Savior and Teacher among us. The movement upward (Part II) is prayer to God the Father, which corresponds to his role as sovereign King and eternal Lover among us. The movement outward (Part III) is prayer to God the Holy Spirit, which corresponds to his role as Empowered and Evangelist among us."

There parts, with seven "types" in each part - a very balanced presentation of a topic we often approach as exclusively spiritual and ethereal. He goes on to say:

"...healthy prayer necessitates frequent experiences of the common, earthly, run-of-the-mill variety. Like walks, and talks, and good wholesome laughter. Like workin the yard, and chit-chat with neighbors, and washing the windows... we need regular exercise in the hills and valleys of ordinary life."

Let us dig a little more deeply into something many people take for granted, and - as such - miss out on what it means to encounter God.

STEWARDSHIP

How to Live a Meaningful Life

A timeless Lesson on which to build our lives – a story worth repeating as we begin a New Year

Many Americans live with two opposite feelings. On one hand, they want to experience meaning and purpose in their lives. On the other hand, they often feel that they are running on empty.

In his classic novel, Les Miserables, Victor Hugo tells us how to eliminate that second feeling. The bishop befriends Jean Valjean and gives him lodging. Valjean repays that kindness by stealing the bishop's valuable candlesticks. After the bishop reports the theft, the police magistrate questions Valjean in the bishop's presence. As the interrogation progresses, Valjean seems headed for jail. At that point, the bishop unexpectedly retracts his charges and offers a plausible reason for why the candlesticks are missing.

Jean Valjean is amazed. When he and the bishop are alone, he says, "Why did you do that? You know I am guilty."

The bishop replies, "Life is for giving."

Why do churches receive an offering in their worship services? Some people say, "Because the church needs the money." That is only part of the answer. Even if a wealthy benefactor fully underwrote our congregation's expenses, we would still need to provide people with the opportunity to give an offering in our worship services. Weekly giving teaches us—and reminds us because we keep forgetting—that life without unselfish giving is life without meaning and purpose.

Victor Hugo is right. Life is for giving.


