FROM JEFF'S DESK

The following comes from "Reformed Worship" Journal, where I found the outline of an idea for how to approach the season of Lent this year.

The season of Lent traditionally begins with a service of repentance on Ash Wednesday. Attendees are invited to receive on their foreheads the mark of the cross, made from ashes. We often think of these ashes as a mark of our penitence, but they also mark us as people who live in the way of the cross. What would it mean if we wore ashes on our foreheads every day? When we don't wear ashes, do the people around us know that we are Christ followers?

This season of Lent, we want to be especially attentive to the ways we co-labor with Christ in lives of servanthood. In Scripture, people called to a particular vocation were often symbolically anointed on the forehead using oil. The prophet Isaiah was marked on the lips with a live coal.

As we journey together during the six weeks of Lent, it would be good to ask questions that will be explored in the series:

What does it mean that we are co-workers with Christ?

What work are we called to do?

How much are you willing to give up for that work?



DEACON'S REPORT FROM THE FEBRUARY 4 MEETING:

SESSION NOTES

SESSION REPORT FROM THE FEBRUARY 18 MEETING:

The Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Oyster Bay held a regular meeting on February 18, 2025. Session welcomed new Junior Elder/Youth Representative James Masler.

CLERK'S REPORT: Cathy noted that the Annual Statistical Report prepared for Presbytery was completed and approved by Session. Cathy has submitted it to Presbytery and will include it in the Book of Minutes.

MODERATOR'S REPORT: Jeff noted with sadness that he performed the funeral and memorial service for Frank Hudak here at the church on February 15, 2025. Frank passed away on February 1, 2025. Deborah gave thanks for all the support of her church family.

CHURCH SUPPORT: Richard noted a small deficit for the month of January. He advised the 2025 Pledge offering goal is short by about \$13,000 at this time. Session has faith that our congregation will fill that shortfall. Session also discussed possible uses of the 2024 budget surplus.

PRESBYTERY REPORT: Jeff and Mia attended the most recent Presbytery Meeting which focused on proposed changes to the Book of Order. Jeff also advised that a new Presbytery Mission Statement also was approved. It reads:

Guided by the Spirit, Our Presbytery follows Christ by partnering with congregations, communities, and individuals to embody God's inclusive love and justice in an everchanging world.

ELDER TRAINING: Session had a discussion about creating a church policy for addressing the possibility of Homeland Security Immigration Enforcement action on our church property, given the recent recission of the so called *Sensitive or Protected Places Policy*. Presbytery has encouraged us to draft such a policy to assert the church's rights under the 4th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution to prevent any search or seizure on our property without a valid judicial warrant. Session approved a motion to draft such a policy.


